<p>Quickly say each of the sounds on the Sounds Chart; change the order each time. If you know the sounds in set 1 try set 2.</p>	<p>Can you make a Chinese dragon by cutting out the 2D shape on the Chinese Dragon Sheet and sticking them on a piece of paper? How many different shapes can you name? Can you tell a grown up how many sides and corners they have?</p>	<p>Read the story ‘Dragons in the City’ with a grown up. What part is your favourite? What would you most look forward to? Can you draw a picture of your favourite part and have a go at writing a short caption?</p>
<p>Enjoy a story read to you by a grown-up.</p>	<p>Can you count, match and order numbers 1-10 using the different options on the Gingerbread man game? https://www.topmarks.co.uk/learning-to-count/gingerbread-man-game</p>	<p>Can you make a Chinese lantern using the template? How will you decorate it? Remember, red is thought to bring good luck!</p>
<p>Keep a diary of what you have done each day. Can you draw pictures and write some words or captions.</p>	<p>Can you complete the Washing Machine Challenge? Use your adding and counting on skills to help you.</p>	<p>Can you use recycled materials to make your own Chinese dragon? How will you make the body move? What colours will you use? Remember you can upload your learning to Purple Mash or email your pictures to learning@castlehill.kent.sch.uk</p>
<p>Practise reading the green words. If you can read the words with set 1 sounds try to read the set 2 words.</p>	<p>Can you complete the gingerbread man dot-to-dot sheet? How many numbers can you recognise? What is the highest number you can count up to on your own?</p>	
<p>Practice counting from 1 to 20.</p>		
<p>Practise writing your numbers to 20 using the number rhymes to help you.</p>	<p>Can you cut out the gingerbread men from the sheet and match them back up to make 10 every time. Can you write the addition number sentences to go with them?</p>	
<p>Sing some of your favourite nursery rhymes and songs.</p>		
<p>Practise reading the red words – remember, these can’t be sounded out. You just need to learn them.</p>	<h2>Literacy</h2>	<h2>Online</h2>
<p>Try and learn the red words. Use the sheet to help you write them. Write the red words on separate pieces of paper. See if your grown-up or sibling can hide them around the house. Can you find them and read the words?</p>		<p>Explore the activities on Phonics Play. https://www.phonicsplay.co.uk Select the ‘resources’ tab, then ‘phase 2’. The free games are great for practising blending, as well as practising alien words.</p>
		<p>Choose 3 sounds you don’t know from set 1 or 2. See if you can learn the sounds and practise writing them. Use the letter rhymes to help you form them correctly. Can you think of any words with those sounds and write those too?</p>
<p>Now that you know the Gingerbread man story really well, can you use the speech bubble sheets to write down a short caption or sentence to tell us what the characters are thinking? Remember to Fred Talk your words.</p>	<p>Can make a picture of a gingerbread man and hide him somewhere? Use your sounds to write some clues for your family to follow and see if they can find him.</p>	<p>Search for ‘Chinese New Year’ on Purple Mash. Have a go at decorating a lion head, a fan or a lantern. Can you write some labels or a sentence about your picture?</p>
